Report from the Group Leader

Another twelve months has passed – and I find myself writing a report for the Annual General Meeting. I need to look back on the 2021/2022 year, a year still impacted by COVID. The Australian Jamboree in Elmore, Victoria was cancelled, and the South Australian event, JamX, was planned for January 2022 at Lucindale. There was a great effort by youth members and families to fundraise for this camp and bags were packed. What a huge disappointment for everyone when JamX was cancelled just a few days prior to the event.

We currently have 67 youth members and 8 Leaders at Magill. All Sections have been going from strength to strength, and this is reflected in the increased number of youth members. Joeys – Our Joey Unit continues to grow, and we now have 12 young ones. Rhys Hill (Emu) is the only Leader and we definitely need another one or two volunteers to put up their hands. I have been helping Rhys, but this is not a long-term solution. It may mean that the Joey Unit will close if there is no-one to help him. I would not like to see this happen. Cubs – The Cub numbers continue to grow and thrive with Rod Whitby (Dingo) and his great team – Bilby (Bianca) and Bagheera (James). James completed his Basic Training and received his certificate and woggle – congratulations. Dingo has been joined by a new Leader, Raj Purba (Baloo), who signed the paperwork and commenced training as Assistant Cub Scout Leader – thank you Raj. There are over 30 Cubs at Magill.

Scouts – Karen McNamara (Red) is ably assisted by Monique (Kiwi) and Mike (Dingo). The Scouts were disheartened when JamX was cancelled, but they looked to the future and planned other activities in their program. The main focus over the last 2 terms has been the construction of the billy carts.

General

This year we again participated in the ANZAC celebrations at The Gums Reserve. The Joeys, Cubs and Scouts slept-over at the hall. Hawkeye visited to help the young ones with the making of wreaths and posies. The youth members and Leaders left very early in the morning to walk to Shakespeare Avenue. A hot breakfast of sausages, bacon and eggs was served at the Magill RSL hall following the service.

We enjoyed a Group Camp at Douglas Scrub (near McLaren Vale) in May 2022. 70 youth members and families participated – the camp theme was Bob the Builder. A huge thank you to Red who organised the activities: construction of catapults, orienteering, making damper, parachuting eggs, making a chariot with pioneer poles and ropes, etc. Thank you all Leaders, Parents and to our new Catering Manager, Megan. The camp was a great success, especially with the campfire on Saturday night with everyone singing, toasting marshmallows, and keeping warm. Congratulations to Max who completed his link from Cubs to Scouts.

I wish to acknowledge the **Parent Committee** – they have worked tirelessly over the last 12 months, with limited fundraising opportunities because of COVID. I appreciate the efforts of all the Committee.

Unfortunately two important Members of the Committee are resigning this year – Jeannine and Jason. Jeannine has efficiently kept minutes of Parent Committee meetings, and both she and Jason have worked tirelessly in assisting with fundraising events over the past five years, as well as camps and working bees at the hall. I wish them both all the best for the future.

Thank you to all current **Leaders** for your efforts – Rhys, Rod, Bianca, James, Raj, Karen, Monique and Mike. The Leaders are not paid, and they come each week to provide fulfilling programs for your children. All the Leaders work full-time, and some of them are studying at University and working part-time. With the continued support of the Committee and Leaders, I know that the group will be successful for the rest of the year.

Closing – There are several ways you can help the Group:

Consider becoming an Adult Helper (or a Leader) – it's not that much work when you are part of a team, and it's a huge amount of fun!

Last year we finally managed to have our ancient kitchen replaced. Thanks go to Sylvia Soon from Campbelltown Council who helped arrange and partially fund it, along with a \$12,000 federal grant obtained by Colleen. A number of helpers did a great job or cleaning out the old equipment and replacing and reorganising the new accessories, complete with labelled cabinets that are just terrific.

Over the past 12 months the Leaders of each section have once again come up with great programs to benefit our youth members and I thank them on behalf of the whole group for their continued efforts. Assistant Leaders and parent helpers are always required, particularly in the Joey Section still, so please do not feel shy about offering to assist in any way – every little bit helps to lighten the load on our existing volunteers.

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Treasurer's Report

Year ended 31 December 2021

The 1st Magill Scout Group financial records for the calendar year 2021 have been audited independently by Scouts SA and submitted to Scouts SA. The closing bank balance at the end of December 2021 was \$12,203.15 plus \$80 petty cash float for fundraising events, which represents a surplus for the year of \$208.13.

Fundraising during 2021 included People's Choice Community Lottery, Thermomix Lottery, BBQ at the Art Gallery, plus Scout JamX disco and chocolate sales. The JamX regrettably was cancelled and the families involved were allocated a % of the JamX profits to offset the deposit paid.

General running of the group comprises around 32% of total expenses as listed below. The detailed summary of 2021 income and expenses is on the next page.

Equipment purchased included a new trailer, portable PA system, vacuum cleaner, A3 Laminator and new patrol boxes for camps. All 2021 memberships have been paid, with a small amount of memberships which are on a payment plan. There were also eight members that joined during term 3 and 4 which helped with the income.

New year 2022

Our current bank balance is \$16,724. Our account has grown in 2022 due to majority of members paying in full at the start of the calendar year. These funds will be used for the remainder of the year's activities, paying quarterly utilities, HQ fees, Christmas group gifts and some Group Leaders wish list for equipment for the Scout Hall.

Membership reminders will go out in term 3 for any fees not received.

As JamX was cancelled due to COVID, this fundraising money was allocated to Scout families to offset the lost deposits.
