Group and Section Leaders' Reports

Report from the Group Leader

We currently have 62 youth members and 11 Leaders at Magill. Two Sections have been going from strength to strength, and this is reflected in the increased number of youth members. The Cub Unit and Scout Unit are full and have a waiting list.

However, the Joey Unit is struggling at present. Emu (Rhys Hill) resigned at the end of 2022, and I have been trying to find two new Leaders, but in vain. I have been running the Joey program since Term 1 2023. However, I have been absent for 4 weeks in Terms 2 and 3 with overseas trips. This has meant that the Joeys have only met for half a term. The numbers are very small at present with 5 Joeys, and I am hesitant to advertise and recruit new Joeys because of the lack of Leaders. If one or two Leaders cannot be found, the Unit will close. I am happy to talk to any parents who think they may be able to assist as a Joey Leader, or you may know someone else who may be interested.

I am pleased to report that the Venturer Unit commenced on 24 July with James Hyder as the Venturer Leader. A second adult is needed each week and a roster of adult helpers has been drawn up to assist James. The Unit is only small in number, but with the older Scouts linking to Venturers next year, this number will increase. James is currently an Assistant Cub Leader and I thank him for accepting the Venturer Leader role. James has many years of Scouting experience as a Cub, Scout, Venturer and Rover at Mildura.

Australian Jamboree 2025 – This camp is to be held at Maryborough in Queensland in January 2025. The Leaders are working with the Scouts to ensure they achieve the criteria needed to attend a Jamboree. The approximate cost is \$3000, and a Jamboree Fundraising Committee is being formed to raise funds to assist some of the Scouts attending.

I wish to acknowledge the **Parent Committee** – they have worked tirelessly over the last 12 months, and I appreciate the efforts of all the Committee.

Thank you to all current **Leaders** for your contribution — Rod, Bianca, James, Emma, Raj, Karen, Monique, Mike, Aria, Michael and Rhys. They also spend some of their weekends to ensure the youth members enjoy camping, bushwalking, etc. With the continued support of the Committee and Leaders, I know that the group will continue to be successful in the future.

Joey Mob Report

The Joeys have had a busy couple of terms with many activities:

It is almost unviable to have a small group of 3 or 4 Joeys attend each week. We may need to look at other local Scout Groups for the Joeys to transfer.

It is important that we find two Leaders for the Joey Unit to continue. As I am the only Leader present, the parents are required to stay each week to assist me. It is difficult being the Group Leader and Joey Scout Leader, and not an ideal situation. Please talk to me if you are interested in becoming a Leader. All Leader training is paid for by the Group, as well as the uniform. Leaders receive a 50% discount on their child's term fees.

I hope that the future improves for the Magill Joeys. If the Unit closes, it is unlikely that it will re-open again for some time.

Our camp at Woodhouse allowed them all to camp independently, cook for themselves, and lead their own adventurous journeys (a six hour hike).

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Treasurer's Report

Year ended 31 December 2022

The 1st Magill Scout Group financial records for the calendar year 2022 have been audited independently by Scouts SA.

The closing bank balance at the end of December 2022 was \$13,375.89 and \$80 float petty cash for BBQ's represented a surplus for the year of \$1,172.

Fundraising during 2022 included People's Choice Community Lottery, Father's Day raffle and BBQ's. There were no Grants received during 2022.

General running of the group is made up of 35% of total expenses as listed below. Insurance and general costs have increased but the group absorbed these costs throughout the year.

Most 2022 Memberships have been paid, with a small amount of memberships which are on a payment plan or carried forward have been settled.

New year 2023

Our current bank balance reconciled at 30 June 2023 is \$14,933.32.

We commenced to use the accounting package Reckon One, lots of administration to set up the members and invoices are emailed, statements are available for members. The expenses are easily costed and receipts saved which saves on keeping the traditional "shoe box of receipts'.

The software is user friendly and costs the group \$210 per year for the subscription.

Top Income and Expenses for 2023 are listed below;



Our account has grown in 2023 due to majority of members paying in full at the start of the calendar year. These funds will be used for the remainder of the year's activities, paying quarterly utilities, maintenance and Christmas group gifts.

The Venturers Group commenced in Term 3 and received \$1,000 from moneys held which has been banked and available for the start-up of this mob.

Scouts SA HQ 12 Month Membership reminders will go out later in term 3 for any fees not received. This fee increased on 1 April 2023 from \$70 to \$150 which is directly paid to Scouts SA for insurance and helps keep the camps at Woodhouse, other SA Scout sites cheaper for Scouts activities. Magill Scouts Group has not increased its term fee of \$75 (second sibling \$70) since 2019. This is why it is important to have all members financial which covers the running of the group smoothly and not likely the need to increase the term fees any time soon.

Grants and Fundraising Report

2022 saw the return of Glynde Mitre 10 BBQs, and the committee would like to thank those leaders, parents and youth who donated their time to run these. Net of expenses, the two BBQs in 2022 resulted in \$672 for the group.

We once again participated in the People's Choice lottery, raising \$790; and ran a Father's Day raffle with most of the prizes donated by local individuals and businesses, which raised \$705.

We were not successful in any grant applications in 2022.

So far this year, we have run one Mitre 10 BBQ and again participated in the People's Choice lottery. We have two dates locked in for Mitre 10 BBQs - Sat 7 Oct and Sat 18 Nov. Please put these dates in your diary, and keep an eye out for the volunteer rosters over the next few weeks. Recognising that we often lose some sales due to the cash only nature of our BBQs, the committee is purchasing a Square reader to enable electronic payments. We are also putting together a Father's Day Raffle again, with tickets going on sale very soon.

A separate committee has been formed to fundraise specifically for AJ2024, spearheaded by Bianca Beeching. This is a costly camp so there will be specific events to raise funds for this. Money raised will be allocated to families on a pro-rata basis, according to the efforts put in - essentially, the more hours a family puts in to helping arrange and run the events, the more subsidy they will receive from the proceeds. Please reach out to Bianca if you would like to be involved - all participation is welcomed, whether it is a little or a lot.
