













A message from the Chief Commissioner



The half year April to September 2021, which this annual report covers, was a unique and memorable period on many levels.

COVID-19 impacted our activities with lockdowns, working from home and home schooling, however through this period the resilience and flexibility of our members shone through. We did lose a small number of youth members and leaders and we plan to address this in the coming financial year. COVID-19 impacted particularly the Cub Scouts section who found it difficult to engage with Scouting at home and leaders chose to retire or step away during this difficult time.

Governance

We continue to strengthen our child-protection processes and visibility. We made good progress in implementing a new campaign around youth safety and support, which is the core of our organisation.

Program

Our vision is Youth Leading and Adult Supporting in all aspects of our organisation. The launch of the new youth program is complete, some 3 years after we started, which entailed careful transition planning. All Groups now engage with the program and we look forward to where this journey will take us. Our youth members achieved milestones and supported each other with adventurous activity progression.













Year of Engagement, Retention and Growth

Welcoming new communities to Scouting is fundamentally important to our growth. During this period we met with MPs, ministers and community leaders to spruik the benefits of Scouting. We pressed these leaders to advocate for Scouts with the Sports Voucher Program in our state and will continue to advocate for Scouts in this campaign.

We met with many MPs and ministers at Scout Halls and relished the opportunity to showcase Scouting and provide them with the understanding as to the ongoing needs of a Scout Hall. We also took this opportunity to Scarf Up members of our wider community that contribute to, or support, Scouting.

We look forward to attracting all communities to Scouting. With the ongoing success and example of the Attagwa Muslim Scout Group, as previously reported (in the 2021 Annual Report), we will continue our efforts to engage other communities and multicultural leaders to expand this program.

Organisational Strength

Through hard work across the Scout Movement, we ended the shortened financial year in good shape, even with COVID-19 restrictions and lockdown.

The new CEO, Rebecca Wilson, commenced her tenure, and has had an immediate and positive impact on our Branch commercial operations and Head Office. We will report further as Rebecca realises her goals for the Branch.

We were delighted with our volunteers and how they responded to the challenges COVID-19 presented. We are proud of our Leaders' response to support our young people to continue with Scouting, albeit in a different model.

Finally, the President has asked me to thank Steve Hastwell, on behalf of the Association, for stepping up to take on the role of Acting CEO from November 2020-August 2021. His expertise and passion for Scouts is unwavering and he guided the Association admirably as Acting CEO.


These grants were much needed to enable young South Australians access to quality equipment, training and facilities in their local community that they may not otherwise have.






Equity over the last 10 years


